The conference dates have been fixed from 16th to 20th oct 2011.



The venue will be Goa

A local organizing committee has been formed with Chandrashekhar Deopujari as Organizing Chairman, Ashok Mahapatra as vice Chairman, B.Chidambaram as Secretary and N.K.Venkatramana as the treasurer. A meeting of the core committee was recently held in Goa for site inspection for conference venue as well as arrangements for other events.

An event management company has been drafted in and various events are being finalized to give a flavor of Indian hospitality.

A website is being built and we are hoping to start registration at jeju with special rates for onsite registrations there. The registration rates will not be more than this year and special packages are being worked out for residents and also for young neurosurgeons in the developing world.

We will have a preconference CME on Pediatric Epilepsy Surgery on Saturday the 15th with ISPN faculty and a hydrocephalous workshop on the 16th.

We would also like to have the permission to hold 2 luncheon symposia on Monday and Wednesday (17 & 19) during the conference and have a special symposium on either CNS infections, craniofacial malformations or CV junction anomalies.

40th Annual Meeting 2012 - Sydney, Australia

Date: September, 9th to the 13th, 2012

Although this date clashes with the end of the Para-Olympics in London, the previous date was changed out of respect to our Jewish colleagues and all other weeks in September clash with other neurosurgical meetings. The weather is fine. Rainfall is minimal.

Venue: The Four Seasons, Sydney

This magnificent hotel has been secured as the meeting venue and meeting hotel. Their rates are most competitive and the main hall accommodates up to 800 attendees. It is located in the Rocks district, the oldest part of Sydney, and in walking distance from the Opera House, harbor ferries, major shopping areas and historical sites. 41st Annual Meeting 2013 – Mainz, Germany

The following report was sent by Wolfgang Wagner. He could not attend the Meeting.

The meeting site (venue) of the 2013 annual congress of the ISPN will be Mainz, Germany. The city of Mainz lies in the heard of Europe, directly at the river Rhine.



The chairman of the meeting will be Wolfgang Wagner.

Negotiations have been started with a professional congress organizing company experienced in the organization of national and international meetings of medical societies.

As date for the meeting, September 29, 2013 (Sunday) – October 3, 2013 (Thursday) is proposed. This date has been discussed with Paul Steinbok and Saffet Mutluer and should cause no conflict with important religious feasts or other scientific meetings. The date has been provisionally fixed by the Congress Centrum Mainz and the congress organizing company. The climate in Germany at this time can be expected to be friendly and moderately warm, ideal for out-door activities.

The Congress Centrum Mainz is basically recommend as venue. It has all necessary conference facilities, is located directly at the river Rhine, a few steps away from Mainz downtown.

Several hotels of different categories are in walking distance.

Mainz is very easy to access from the international airport Frankfurt Rhein-Main. It is linked to the airport by regularly circulating trains and other public transportation. At the congress site itself, all scientific activities including welcome reception and gala dinner are possible in walking distance.

Several social activities will be offered: Cruise on the river Rhine to the famous Loreley cliff (half day tour), guided tours through Mainz (St. Martin's Cathedral, St. Stephan (Chagall windows), Gutenberg Museum and other museums, and many more); bicycle tour through the nearby Rheingau (vineyards), vine tasting in Rheinhessen, excursions to Wiesbaden, Frankfurt or Darmstadt; pre-/post-congress tours to Cologne, Heidelberg, Worms, Speyer etc.. A golf/tennis tournament will be arranged in the vicinity of Mainz.

Safety and security are no special problems in Mainz (they are comparable to other German cities with a few hundred thousands population). Tourists as well as inhabitants generally feel safe in this city.

The congress company has started negotiations with the Congress Centrum Mainz and possible sponsors to create a budget balancing the financial interests of all involved parties. All efforts will be made to cause no financial loss to the ISPN.

Comments:

- 1) The totals for the months of January and February seem incorrect. I will need to contact our banker to determine how they arrived at these numbers.
- 2)The fees for Citrin Cooperman for preparation of 501c3 is non-recurring but the ISPN still has to file a tax return yearly. Accounting fees for tax preparation this year were \$2500.00 and will likely be recurring costs.
- 3) We still have 65 of our 270 active members who have not paid 2010 dues. By our bylaws, any member who doesn't pay dues for 2 years in a row is moved to inactive status. We need to consolidate our lists between the membership committee, the communications committee, the treasurer and the secretary into one accurate list.
- 4) Springer withheld \$ 15,245.12 in Income Tax and \$838.48 in Solidarity Tax yielding a net Royalty payment to ISPN 78,367,02 EUR. After taxes we received \$85,529.59 USD. We are applying to the German authorities as a US tax exempt organization but have not heard back from them yet as to whether we can reclaim any of these monies. On the other hand, we paid Springer EUR 52,959.00 or \$68,822.61 for a net ISPN profit of \$16,706.98. At the same time, Springer informed us that Child's Nervous System produced EUR 553,391.57 profit for them this year (\$697,273.38 USD). Given that we are the editorial board, we solicit and collect the annual subscription fees, and they list 0 dollars sold in advertising this year, I would suggest that ISPN does most of the work, receives a nominal payment, and Springer gets ¾ million dollars a year profit from CNS. Based upon this, I would suggest we send out a request for proposals to several big publishing houses (Elsevier, Thieme, JNS Publishing group) and see if our contract with Springer is equitable.

10.5. Committee Reports

a. Audit - Shlomi Constantini

The following report was sent by Dr. Constantini.

The treasurer's report is approved!

We did have some questions resolved during this approval process, mainly with the Pasadena organizing company.

I would like to add a word of caution, which I have expressed to many of you personally:

The officers within the EB of the ISPN may be personally legally accountable for financial, non-regulatory procedures.

Such regulations, because we are an international organization, may be according to USA/NY law (where we are registered now), and/or according to the specific country where the yearly activity is being held. Just as an example, US and European regulations are beginning not to approve meetings held in *resorts*. This is just an example how the *regulation-era*, will be affecting us all more and more.

This *financial-issue phobia* that I have, has also to do with our discussion on a potential LCO.

b. By-Laws - Wan-Tew Seow

By-Laws Committee Final Report for 2009-2010



The main duty of the By-Laws Committee for 2009-2010 was to revise and rework the ISPN's Constitution and By-laws which arose as a result of the Incorporation of the ISPN as a charitable organisation in New York as of November 2009.

The by-laws following Incorporation were drafted by New York lawyer, Mr Michael Markhoff, who did the process of incorporation on behalf of the ISPN and was sent out by Rick Abbott.

Although there was essentially no change to the ISPN's original Constitution & By-laws' except for what was needed for the process of incorporating the ISPN in NY, there was debate about some of these draft changes to the by-laws. In particular, some parts of the original draft were deemed to be too commercialised, e.g. using the name "ISPN Inc", "Board of Directors" as examples.

Several Exco have helped and gave their comments and suggestions on these changes, especially Rick Abbott (and Michael Markhoff, the lawyer who initiated the changes), President-elect Paul Steinbok, the Secretary and our President. Terms and phrases thought to make the ISPN sound like a business entity were changed to match the original as much as possible. Some of the sections were removed because they were redundant and new ones added, with some changes to clarify the roles of the executive, etc, as required for incorporation.

A foreword was added to let viewers know about the progress and incorporation of the ISPN and the reasons for it, but essentially the Constitution & By-laws have remained unchanged. The changes have been reviewed and approved by our lawyer, Mr Markhoff. Subsequently, a "final" version was sent to the Executive Board via email for further discussion and from thence a "finalized" version will be tabled to the Executive Board during the Executive meeting in Jeju before presentation to members of the Society at the Business Meeting for voting, as these changes in the C&B flow from the act of Incorporation, which had already been approved by the members. The members' approval will complete the incorporation process for the ISPN.

Flowing from the By-laws Committee's report to the Executive meeting in 2009, the current Committee is tasked to look at the rights and obligations of a new category of membership for nurses and healthcare professionals namely Allied Health Professional (AHP) membership. The Committee's recommendation is as follows:

"Health Professional (AHP) members shall be required to pay a reduced membership fee (as recommended by the Membership Committee) and are entitled to attend Annual Scientific Meetings (at reduced rates as recommended by the Membership Committee), but are entitled to participate in the Annual Business Meeting of the Society. They may not vote and may not hold office. They may be invited to participate in other activities of the ISPN and be members of Standing Committees and Special Committees."

e. Communication - William Harkness

The following report was sent by Dr. Harkness on October 26, 2010

Report of Communication Committee

1. Website 2010

We launched the ISPN website during our Annual Meeting in Pasadena last year and have received universally favourable feedback. We have also integrated our payment system for the annual fees (please see Treasurers report) and at 25/10/2010 we have 230 members registered on the website. As we appear on paper to have a larger membership than those registered to the site we either have some members who do not wish to be registered on the website or alternatively members who are not aware of the changes that have taken place. I think the former explanation only counts for very few individuals and believe that the majority of those who have not registered simply are not aware of what has happened. Because of this I have sent repeated emails, using our old membership list, to the addresses that we have on file. A significant number of these have returned as the information is out of date. I have also asked those who are registered on the site to contact those who they know personally to get them to sign up. Any other suggestions would be gratefully received but I think that having a reduced member's rate for the annual meeting has resulted in some of our members engaging. There has been little interaction with the website from the membership. Many of the facilities that we have provided have not been taken advantage of. There could be a number of reasons for this but without doubt this needs to shape our strategy for 2011 (see below).

As a result of limited funding for 'Phase II' we refocused our attentions in 2010 onto the ability of the website to incorporate presentations, videos etc. The result of this can be seen in the sample Chapter for the ISPN Guide (see below) distributed by Rick Abbott. This will be the foundation of other initiatives in the future and so the infrastructure developed will be invaluable.

2. Funding for Website

Following the meeting in Pasadena I had understood that the Executive had given me the mandate to pursue Charitable funding for the further work on the website. I invited suggestions from the Executive as to who we could approach and we have managed to secure a further \$75k in 2010. It should be said however, that this process was difficult and time consuming. It became much easier with the recognition by the IRS of our charitable status but nonetheless if we are going to continue with this source of funding for the website I think that we must expect to have to commit a lot of time to this exercise. The delay meant a great deal of uncertainty with regards the progress on the website and progress was not slowed due to the good will of Moonbrand.

I would therefore like to propose that the Communication Committee is empowered on behalf of the ISPN to develop commercial sponsorship of the site. We believe that the site now developed and especially with the plans for 2011, represents the sort of commercial opportunity that Industry would be keen to contribute to. The Committee would pledge to do this in an in obtrusive way and would not employ pop ups. We would allow feeds to commercial sites from our webpages. We would seek the help of Moonbrand in the design of this and also in the appropriate costing.



3. Abstract Link

As had been discussed and agreed in Pasadena we secured the use of an externally available Abstract Management system (Oxford Abstracts) for our 2010 meeting. There has been feedback from the Meeting Chairman and also the Scientific Chairman.

4. Chairpersons Mail System

The mailing system for officers of the Society has been set up through Googlemail. At the outset there were some problems expressed by some and it appeared that some mailservers rejected the emails as spam. These problems appeared to diminish with time but I am not sure whether they truly reduced or if people found ways around them. It has been suggested that upgrading to Googlemail Platinum would be a way of getting around this. I looked into this but at the time we did not have Charitable Status and so this would have incurred a cost.

5. Voting and Communication between Executive Committee

During the course of 2010 there were a number of issues raised that required a response from the Executive so as not to delay changes in action or policy. Emailing individuals or groups and asking for a response appeared to be a slow and clumsy process. There are a number of options in terms of running polls and these could be left as the sole responsibility of the Secretary and President or the Communication Committee could set up a 'solution' which we could run. This is unlikely to be a purpose built solution but rather a uniform protocol by which we use an external system.

6. Establishing Communication Committee

It has become apparent to me as Chairman of the Communication Committee over the course of 2010 that the work of running, maintaining, developing and updating the website is far beyond the capability of one individual. It is not just a question of complexity, as the instructions given by Moonbrand are very comprehensive and easy to understand, but more due to the time involved and that we wish to do this work ourselves rather than devolve it to a third party. It is for this reason that I approached our President Saffet Mutluer and asked for permission to enrol the services of a Communication Committee and allocate individual tasks to them to spread the responsibility of the website and thereby strengthen it. The composition of this Committee is from individuals that represent different geographical areas that we cover and who bring different skills.

The Committee consists of the following:-

7. The Guide



At our meeting in Pasadena the issue of an On Line textbook was discussed and appeared to meet general approval. There has been much interaction during the course of the year due to the work of Prof Rick Abbott and the opportunity presented by the work already achieved by Dr Ann Ritter and colleagues. In Mid August our President sent an email to Rick Abbott after consulting with the Executive stating the following:-

- 1. The ISPN should proceed with the guide
- 2. Rick Abbott, who is initiator of this project, should continue as Editor in Chief.
- 3. There needs to be collaboration with the editor in chief of Child's Nervous system, who should also be one of the editors-in -chief or senior editors.
- 4. All editors should be members of the ISPN
- 5. All authors should be members of the ISPN unless the expertise for a particular chapter is not available within the ISPN membership
- 6. Dr Abbott should proceed to create a sample chapter, which should be completed prior to the Jeju meeting
- 7. Further work on other chapters should not proceed until the executive discusses this further in Jeju and confirms the guidelines for authorship
- 8. The roles of the chairs of the education committee and communications committee in this project need to be defined.
- 9. The overall structure of the guide needs to be reviewed by the ISPN to determine if the current format is acceptable or if another format would be preferable.
- 10. The costs of the guide need to be reviewed. If the guide is approved, a business plan for the future will have to be developed.

The sample Chapter is now available and access to this has been granted to all members of the Executive to review. (http://guide.ispneurosurgery.org/)

8. Vision for 2011

In Pasadena we presented a plan for a three phased website development based on our perception of our needs and capabilities at that stage. An operational website was delivered to the ISPN membership last October and during the course of 2010 we have completed all aspects of Phase I. We have also worked on some aspects of phase II but the member's blog and news areas have not been delivered, nor have we explored the webcasting of meetings. This has been as a result of limited finance and not because of inability to deliver. As stated above there are other areas which have not been developed to their full potential.

We would therefore like to propose for 2011 that we have a year of consolidation of the website and address the following issues:-

1. Case of the Month.

We shall reintroduce a 'case of the month' section to be distributed to all members and named in honour and memory of our late colleague Edgardo Schijmann. I already have volunteers from the Communication Committee to manage this. No costs would be required but need to confirm this with Moonbrand as we would post these on the website as well as circulate to members.

2. Members Blog

We shall introduce a member's blog to allow discussion of the case of the month and other issues relating to the Society. A member of the Communication Committee will oversee this. Development costs are required for this.

3. Newsletters



The Communication Committee will produce a newsletter, at the start on a quarterly basis, to inform the membership about ISPN issues and general health issues of importance at a national or Global level. Two editors from different geographical locations will be invited to contribute to this. No costs would be involved in this.

4. Liaison with Education Committee

We have had discussions in the past about the uploading of presentations given at the teaching courses onto the website. We shall invite the Education Committee to propose one or two individuals to develop a template for presentations and then edit and upload the presentations so that they are available to members. The capability to do this has been developed this year and so this will be a natural progression of the work already in place. Minor costs would be involved in creating the area on the website.

5. Updating of the site content

Since the suite was launched the appearance of the site has altered very little. We propose that the Committee will invite contributions of material, including photos, scans etc to improve and update the appearance of the site so it remains vital.

6. Appointment of Website Editor

In order for there to be an overall editorial control of the site and to ensure that all the elements of the work come together, it is recommended that we appoint an overall Editor of the website. This editor should work very closely with the Chairman of the Communication Committee, the Educational Committee Chairs and the Editor of Child's Nervous System. He or she should be appointed for a period of not exceeding 5 years and be directly accountable to the Executive Board which he/she may be a member of but not as a result of being the website editor. This editor will also have the responsibility of liaising with the Treasurer of the Society over funding and sponsorship issues.

9. Logo

The revised version of the ISPN logo was presented at the Pasadena meeting having previously been circulated to the members of the executive. A presentation was given which included the basis for selecting the logo and the process of its design. There have been about three objections to the logo, principally centred around whether or not the spine should be included. The argument for not including the spine is based around getting the globe as comprehensive as possible and this would be compromised if the spine is included. If the Executive and in turn the members do not wish to accept the logo in its current format then we shall have to fund any proposed changes as all of the original work was done 'pro bono' by Moonbrand and in addition we would need to wait a further year before this is instituted. I appreciate that the logo may not be favoured by all but is there significant enough dissent to justify the added costs and delay? We need to make a decision as to what we wish to do.

f. Ways & Means - Sergio Cavalheiro

Dr. Cavalheiro delivered his report. ISPN received 13 applications for scholarship. 6 applications met the requirements. 4 from India, 1 from Nigeria and 1 from United Kingdom. The winners are:

Scientific Committee Report for ISPN2010

1. **Members**:

J Kestle (Chair), Chidambaram Balasubramaniam, Helio Machado, Francesco Sala, Young-Shin Ra, Yasuo Yamanouchi, Kyu-Chang Wang (Annual Meeting Chair),

2. Timeline for meeting preparation.

The process of abstract submission and review was earlier this year. We did this in order to add a registration requirement to the process. Before final abstract acceptance the presenter had to be registered for the meeting. The timeline was:

Feb 2, 2010 First call for abstract

April 30, 2010 Abstract deadline

May 24, 2010 Authors notified of results of abstract review. They were then required to

register for the meeting.

June 18, 2010 Final acceptance of the abstract if the presenter was registered.

June 30, 2010 Formatted abstract sent to Child's Nervous System

Summer 2010 Invitations sent to invited speakers.

August/September 201 0 Invitations sent to ISPN members to Chair sessions. As much as possible, each session had 2 moderators, one from Korea and one from elsewhere. In order to get moderators for the sessions, the accepted abstracts were reviewed. It was assumed that people whose abstracts were accepted, would be attending the meeting and therefore would be potentially available to moderate sessions. An attempt was also made to have a diverse group of moderators from the broad geographic areas represented at the meeting. The Scientific Committee and the Society Officers were also represented amongst the moderators.

3. Oxford System for Abstracts.

This system was used for sending notices re abstracts, abstract submission and review. It does the job nicely once you learn the system but the support from the company is poor. Each time I emailed for help I was simply referred to the help section of their web site. The information was there but it was frustrating to have to work through problems on my own.


4. Meeting data

263 Abstracts were received (including 12 from nurses). Meeting attendees will be allowed a maximum of 2 accepted abstracts. Eleven abstracts were rejected because they were the third abstract from the same presenter. That presenter's lowest scored abstract was rejected. All of the



remaining 252 abstracts were accepted, including 62 full presentations, 70 flash presentations 12 nursing presentations and 108 electronic posters. The categories are:




5. **Review process**.

Kestle reviewed all abstracts and each abstract had two additional reviewers. The three scores were averaged and ranked within subject categories. The highest scores were chosen for full presentation, followed by flash presentation and posters. Authors were notified of their format based on this process. Specific requests for one format versus another from authors were honored as much as possible.

Scores by format:





6. Awards and Scholarships

Raimondi award. The Raimondi award had no applicants this year.

<u>Trainee awards</u>. This was a new award instituted by KC Wang for this meeting. The 15 highest scoring abstracts written by residents were given a reduced registration fee for the meeting. There were 46 abstracts that had indicated they wanted to compete for one of these awards. When we reviewed them we found that a large number were not being presented by the trainee. In order to receive the award the trainee had to be the presenter. This significantly reduced the number that were considered. Ultimately 13 were awarded. The winners will be honored at the podium.

<u>Best post awards</u>. The posters were collected ahead of time and distributed to the Scientific Committee for review and scoring prior to the meeting. The winner will be honored at the podium.

<u>Scholarships</u>. Six scholarships were awarded by the Ways and Means Committee. They will be reported by the Ways and Means Chair.

In the future if the "Trainee awards" are again made available, their applications need to be coordinated with the Scholarship applications to the Ways and Means Committee. At least one person received and Trainee award and then emailed to say that they had also received a Scholarship. Their Trainee award (which is lesser value) was re-assigned.

7. **Preparation of the program**

Full presentations were allowed 10 minutes (7 for presentation and 3 for questions which immediately follow the talk. Flash presentations were allowed 3 minutes and 5 slides with discussion of each group of flash presentations at the end of the session. Invited speakers were allowed 20 minutes. The meeting organizer formatted the final program and sent it to the Chair for review.

There is proposal of the AANS Ped Section Chair, dr. Ann Christine-Duhaime, to possibly have a member of the AANS Liaison Education Committee to be also member of the ISPN Liaison Committee, so that he/she can basically be dedicated to the liaison between ISPN and AANS Peds Section.

From a practical point of view, it should be identified a North-American ISPN member who is in the AANS Peds Education Committee, and include him in the Liaison ISPN Office sub-committee. Independently from whoever will take over the Liaison Office in the future, I think this could be a good proposal and was trying to contact Christine Duhaime to have her feedback on a couple of eligible members from the AANS perspective.

10.7. Child's Nervous System Concezio Di Rocco

The following report was sent by Dr. Di Rocco on October 25, 2010

The journal continues to represent the international voice of Pediatric Neurosurgery and maintains a satisfactory position among the neurosurgical journals. The flow of papers submitted continues to increase constantly. In spite of the high percentage of rejection – it was necessary to ask the Publisher (and to obtain from) a higher number of pages in order to not delay publication excessively.

Actually, we are faced with an editorial dilemma: whether to limit the number of articles published by selecting only those from high specialized research and clinical centers (this will result in an increase of the IF) or continues to represent pediatric neurosurgery in its full extent, that is to accept also papers originating from countries and centers where pediatric neurosurgery is still in a developing phase (this will obviously decrease the IF).

Indeed, the last IF (2009) of the journal decreased slightly to a value of 1.214.

With regard to the sources of accepted contributions (period September 2009-September 2010) Europe continues to provide most of the papers (98) followed by North America (58 -40 USA, 17 Canada, 1 Mexico-) and Asia (50). Twelve papers came from South America, 11 from Africa, 5 Middle East and 4 from Australia. These figures indicate a worldwide presence of the journal, though it would expected a higher contributes by some leading countries.

There were no applications for the Raimondi's Award.

The 2011 Annual Issue will concern Hydrocephalus and the Editor is Prof. Shizuo Oi.

For 2012 I didn't receive any proposal; consequently, I would like to propose myself and Dr. Tamburrini for an issue devoted to Craniosynostosis, a field in which numerous and important progresses have been recorded in the last few years.

An important issue to be discussed is the relationships between the journal and the proposed Guide to be published on the web site.

Since the last year, there is an up going discussion between two CNS editors and Springer for a project of an electronic addition to the journal to provide the readers a new instrument of knowledge, connected to our journal, which will also provide a free access to articles and books published by Springer. In the frame of such a discussion, Springer was asked by the Editor whether it could accommodate the Guide and which could be the conditions. Springer is ready to host the Guide without any cost but even considering some royalties for the Society.



I would appreciate whether this opportunity could be discussed by the Executive Board at the occasion of Jeju meeting.
